



INFORMATION FOR BUYERS

HOLTS charges a premium to the buyer on the hammer price of each lot sold at the following rates:

25% up to and including £50,000

20% in excess of the hammer price above £50,000

Any bids submitted via the Invaluable and The Saleroom platforms will incur a surcharge.

For UK residents VAT is payable on the premium at the rate of 20%. This is not recoverable under current UK VAT rules. VAT is also applicable to the hammer price when marked in the lot description as follows:

Items marked (dagger symbol) are subject to 20% VAT on the hammer price as the goods are newly manufactured.

Items marked * are subject to 5% VAT on the hammer price as an antique import.

Items marked ** are subject to 20% VAT on the hammer price as a modern import. Lots indicated with § are a modern import of post-1939 manufacture, component parts will be marked in accordance with the UK's OGIL requirements before release.

No VAT will be applied to the invoice of any buyer residing outside of the UK.

OTHER NOTES:

Bladed products are not for sale to people under the age of 18. By bidding on an edged weapon you are declaring that you are 18 years of age or over. Upon collection photo identification will be required if a person appears under 25, to prove that they are over 18 years old. Please be aware that we are unable to send edged weapons or bladed products by postal courier to a UK residential address (Offensive Weapons Act 2019).

FIREARMS ACT 1968 (AS AMENDED)

Purchasers must hold a valid licence to purchase the item they are bidding on.

Private buyers resident within the UK who have successfully bid on a Section 1 or Section 2 item must send by Recorded Delivery their original shotgun/firearm certificate to Holts in advance of making payment. The certificate will be checked and completed on day of receipt and returned by Recorded Delivery, at which point payment should be made. Successful bidders not in possession of a valid authority are requested to pay a deposit of 95% of the invoice total with the remaining 5% payable once the certificate has been checked and completed. Antique and Obsolete Calibre weapons are sold as exempt items under Section 58 (2) of the 1968 Firearms act – to be held as a curiosity or ornament only. Please note that by bidding on these items you declare that you are not a Prohibited Person as defined by Section 21 of the Firearms Act 1968 (as amended).

Section 5 items may only be bid on by current Section 5 licence holders without exception. A valid Section 5 authority must be produced in order to view prohibited weapons. Overseas buyers should be aware that items classified as Section 5 prohibited weapons under UK law will incur additional shipping charges regardless of their classification outside the UK.

Buyers of items covered by Section 7 should refer to chapter 9 of the Home Office 'Firearms Law – Guidance to the Police' for eligibility and restrictions.

Unless prior arrangement has been made, two weeks after the Sealed bid sale, all Section 5 (and Section 7.1 / 7.3) items will be moved to a Section 5 carriers where storage charges will be incurred.

NOTE TO OVERSEAS BUYERS:

Please be aware that items classified as Section 5 Prohibited Weapons under UK Law will incur additional shipping charges regardless of their classification outside of the UK.

Please be aware that under current UK restrictions, no modern firearms, edged weapons (or component parts) of Russian origin can be exported outside of the United Kingdom.

Goods will not be released until all outstanding charges have been met. Collection will be by arrangement.

Buyers should make arrangements with Mrs Laura Arnold in advance of the sale date should they wish to pay by cheque. All major debit and credit cards accepted.

Purchasers are responsible for shipping charges and licensable items can only be sent to a registered RFD.

Purchases may be collected on the day of the sale or by appointment from our gunroom in Norfolk. Cleared funds need to have been received and the necessary licence produced. It may be possible by prior arrangement (minimum seven days notice) to organise collection from a valuation day or delivery to a Registered Firearms Dealer.

We are unable to send ammunition and cartridges.

CA94894, for between 1949-55, with 18 1/2in. blued barrel, dove-tailed fore-sight, elevating notch rear-sight, plain air-chamber brightly etched with make and model details, beech half-stock with impressed trade mark to left hand side of butt (small chips to fore-end caused by cocking link pin), the whole retaining the majority of its original finish and in collector's external condition

A SCARCE .22 PARK RIFLE CO. RECOILLESS TWIN-PISTON DELUXE AIR-RIFLE, serial no. 1073, circa 1991, with blued 22 1/2in. floating barrel including factory-fitted sound-moderator, no open sights, bolt action receiver signed 'THE PARK RIFLE CO LTD.' over 'UK PAT. NO. 2181524' and 'USA PAT. NO. 4870945', blued double-air-chamber, rear mounted safety catch, chequered walnut right hand half-stock with rubber recoil pad, partially concealed under-lever, retaining virtually all its original finish and appearing little used

Provenance: The Park Rifle was a short lived design brought out by The Park Rifle Company and built on John Whiscombe's patent of twin pistons firing towards each other eliminating recoil and increasing swept volume. The unique design of the Park Rifle was its use of a bicycle chain concealed within the fore-end running on gears which drew the pistons apart equally. Whilst of brilliant design, its weight, coupled with the resurgence of pre-charged pneumatic guns led to its quick demise. It is believed less than 1500 rifles were produced

Provenance: Of the many variants of HW35, the walnut stocked 'Luxus' is one of the hardest models to find in the UK, with the majority of buyers prefering the HW35 'E'. The three panel chequered fore-end was dropped in favour of a plain finish in around 1980





Provenance: Bill Sanders of Air Arms launched the '100' range of rifles in 1989. In 1991, he hired Nick Jenkinson to design a 'no holds barred' custom stock and the result was the NJR100, which rapidly became the must-have rifle in the Air Arms line up, going on to take many championships on the field target circuit



no. 33431, made between 1985-91, with blued 15in. barrel retaining its scarce moulded alloy fore-sight, abs plastic tap-handle with funnelshaped loading aperture, blued air-chamber marked 'AIR ARMS' with machined dove-tail for a telescopic sight and retaining its rear mounted aperture sight, chequered walnut half-stock with Tyrolean style cheekpiece and rubber recoil pad, factory fitted sling swivels, the whole in little used collector condition

Provenance: The new firm of Air Arms, born from the wreckage of the old Sussex Armoury in the early 1980's quickly realised that there was demand for a quality British made sporting air-rifle to compete head-on with the dominant German manufacturers. Air Arms were well known for their paramilitary style air-rifles, but trends were changing and demand for these was falling away. The Camargue (named for the region in France where the walnut came from) was a ground breaking rifle that made everyone sit up and take notice. Full UK power, smooth in operation and accurate as any available at the time quickly saw it become an airgun classic. Most were supplied with the optional sound-moderator muzzle-weight; very few were set up with open sights as presented here



Provenance: The largest of the Daystate Wolverine family, the 303 generates up to 120 ftlbs of muzzle energy and is equipped with 5-round magazines. UK purchasers must have the relevant section 1 firearms licence for possession.





A RARE 8mm 'KURBELSPANNER' CRANK-WOUND GALLERY AIR-RIFLE, no visible serial number, German circa 1895, with blued octagonal 21 1/2in. brass-lined smoothbore barrel dropping slightly to load via a side-catch, dove-tailed fore-sight, standing notch rear-sight, plain air-chamber (possibly originally nickel-plated), chequered walnut butt-stock concealing the trigger mechanism, adjustable trigger, the right side of action body with circular aperture to accept a cocking handle (a good reproduction included), brass replacement heel-plate and walnut splinter fore-end (old repairs)

Provenance: The brainchild of Ken Turner, the Air Arms Pro Sport took spring airgun technology to the next level and is reckoned by most to be the ultimate conventionally powered air rifle available today. The gilded details on this particular example are very unusual and whilst obviously professionally applied, the custom house responsible is unknown

BONEHILL SOLE MANUFACTURER', the side of breech stamped 'THE BRITANNIA' surrounding a seated figure of Britannia bisecting the legend 'REGD TRADE MARK', stirrup barrel locking latch, slanted airchamber with applied walnut comb, cocking link housing the trigger-unit stamped 'RD394207', traces only of finish with some patchy shallow pitting

DESIGN' over the serial number, bolt action single-shot pellet feed, blued air-chamber and under-lever, hand chequered walnut stock, two-stage colour-hardened trigger, black crackle finished muzzle-cap and trigger-guard bow and fitted with swivels for a sling, collector's external condition and fitted with a period Sterling Bisley Deluxe 4x32 rubber armoured telescopic sight £300-500

Provenance: The Sterling HR83 was introduced in 1983 as an upmarket version of the Sterling HR81, which had experienced successful sales since its introduction in 1981. Apart from the addition of a hand selected walnut stock, the other major change with the HR83 was the introduction of a new two-stage trigger. Unfortunately this trigger proved extremely problematic, many broke resulting in the factory having to almost hand make every one. Indeed, it was commented on at the time that every trigger that left the factory was different in some way. This slow and laborious process resulted in only around 100 rifles being produced - indeed, so few were made that Sterling never even tooled an 'HR83' stamp for the model designation

Provenance: The Kynoch Swift is a hard air-rifle to obtain and this is an excellent example of the marque. With a production run believed less than a thousand pieces, it quickly found it couldn't compete economically with the Lincoln Jefferies & BSA under-levers. At the time of production, break barrel air-rifles had a reputation for poor quality construction leading to inefficient barrel lock-up. George Hookham and Edward Jones (believed Kynoch employees) set about to overturn this by completely over engineering the locking jaws. The end result certainly worked, but the slight gain in loading speed was soon over-shadowed by the economics and generally superior marketing of its under-lever rivals. As an aside, the trademarks register artist seems very confused by Swifts and Swallows even though the actual birds do not even belong to the same family. The registration entry actually says the trademark represents a Swallow rather than a Swift. In 1905, a linen thread making merchant used a similar 'Swift' trademark in the register that prevented Kynoch using a similar Swift trademark is possibly this factor





Most of the examples subsequently manufactured (believed less than 50) were sold as 'Beeman Gamekeepers' in the US. The company was wound up in 1997

Provenance: Despite the success of the TX range of under-lever rifles since the first one was launched in 1991, Air Arms recognised that there was still demand for break barrel rifles and wanted to add one to their range. As with the TX range, Air Arms enlisted the services of designer Ken Turner and in 1995 Ken produced pre-production prototypes. Over almost 2 years Air Arms carried out a lot of testing and redevelopment. With the high power market of the USA being considered likely to be the most lucrative, the rifle was designed to be capable of providing up to 30ft.lbs muzzle energy. During testing, Air Arms had an employee fire a pre-production model 10000 times at F.A.C. power levels. Reportedly, when they then stripped and checked it not one issue was identified. Early in 1997 Air Arms were finally happy with the rifle and it was released as the Pro-Elite, which they described as "the ultimate tool for the professional pest controller" and "the man sized out and out hunting break barrel". Shortly after release, 300 Pro-Elites were exported to a private company in Saudi Arabia. It is rumoured these were used for training by the Saudi military but this has never been confirmed. Due to telescopic sights being illegal in Saudi Arabia at the time, the rifles exported there were fitted with open sights, but it is believed this option was not offered for the general production models, although Air Arms would always try and accommodate special customer requirements when requested. Production ceased in 2003, giving the Pro-Elite a relatively short life, and the total production was only 1436. Of these, 907 were .22 calibre & 529 were .177 calibre. 806 (56%) of the Pro-Elites produced were exported, the majority of the .22 production. Stock wise, apparently 57 rifles were produced with walnut stocks. In the end, it was always going to be difficult to compete in the pivotal U.S. market with a number of well priced break-barrel options such as the Weihrauch HW80 being readily available. Pre-charged pneumatics were also becoming far more affordable, further hindering sales, and soon most companies, not just Air Arms, had dropped their firearms-rated springoperated rifles

Provenance: In 1985 no .25 air-rifles were being produced by any major manufacturer, but Cobra Arms International Ltd of Merseyside, England, believed there was a viable market and formed specifically to produce one. Sadly, the enterprise soon ran into problems, mainly due to the lack of vavilable ammunition. Barrels in .25 were not being produced commercially, so the Cobra Strike was actually bored on machinery made for .243 centrefire rifles, Winchesters to be precise. This led to the majority of the already small amount of .25 pellet brands being too tight in the bore and customers soon gave up trying trying to source suitable slugs or bothering with sizers and the like. Today, owners of Cobra Strikes will find that 'Marksman' brand pellets will work best as they are softer lead than most [assuming they can find them of course]







Provenance: A hand-written note accompanying the dirk reads "The property of the late J. Alan Rennie, Scottish Historian and author. Presented to him by Lord Balharrie. Over 100 years old." J Alan Rennie is listed as a Scottish author but later, his dates being 1899-1969, and therefore this dirk was probably second hand when he acquired it. No record of a Lord Balharrie (a misspelling?) appears to exist. However the maker is very interesting. Peter George Wilson, born 1845 was a prestigious maker of Highland jewellery in Inverness. He moved to 8 Union Street, Inverness in 1865 and remained there until 1873 when he relocated to 44 High Street. (hence this dirk dates to 1865-1873). Baron Rothschild visited his shop and was so impressed that he purchased several pieces. They were seen by the Prince and Princess of Wales and in 1867 Wilson was summoned to Balmoral where he received large orders from Queen Victoria and the Royal Family. In 1868 he was granted the Royal Warrant. The business was sold off in 1915





Saw active service during the Peninsular War, taking part in the battles of Coa, Bussaco, Pombai, Redinha, Casal Novo, Sabugal, and Fuentes de Ofioro. Promoted Major 1811, was at the sieges of Cuidad Rodrigo and Badajoz, and battles of Salamanca and Vitoria, following which he was rewarded with promotion to Lieutenant Colonel in 1813. 

Provenance: Shirburn Castle Is a brick-built fortified manor house in Oxfordshire. Originally begun in around 1380, it had circular towers on each corner, a gate tower and a moat that was fed by local springs. Despite being dramatically altered in the 18th and 19th centuries, the building still retains the majority of its original brickwork. In 1716 the 1st Earl of Macclesfield (family name Parker) bought the castle from the Gage family. The Parkers had been Royalists during the Civil War, but after the restoration, Gerald Parker was promoted to the position of Lieutenant General of all the English Forces and despite a dubious financial record, had been created the 1st Earl Macclesfield in 1679. Due to these financial irregularities, a second appointment of 1st Earl (an almost unique occurrence) was created in 1721 and given to Thomas Parker, son of the first 1st Earl. He was found guilty of accepting bribes whilst Chancellor of the Exchequer and fined the astonishing sum of £30,000. It is the belief that the 4th Earl, also Thomas, established the carbines in the armoury in around 1780, which already housed a number of weapons unique to the castle. Only seven of this type of arm were produced by three different gunmakers; Ferguson, Wogdon and Egg. The first two only produced one each, the Ferguson example built with his breechloading system. Durs made the remaining five, three with 30in. barrels and two with 24in. as offered here. No satisfactory evidence has been forthcoming as to the peculiar stock design with the most likely explanation being it was an attempt to balance the arm for single handed use whilst on horseback, but another theory is that the stock was modelled to imitate the locking bar from the front door of the castle which was of similar profile. Internal disputes within the Parker family regarding inheritance matters resulted in the 9th Earl having to relinquish his occupancy in 2004 and many of the contents have been subsequently sold at auction. The contents of the armoury were purchased privately by a UK dealer and dispersed We are gratefully indebted to the late Alan Brett for the above information

Provenance: Very few Bailey patent carbines are known to remain in existence. Thomas Bailey was an American inventor and was granted British Patent 907 on April 13th, 1861. 





Provenance: This rare carbine was one of 24 arms submitted for the 1864 Government trials. The aim was to seek the best conversion to breech-loading of the current Enfield group of arms. The offerings submitted by Mont Storm were broken down as follows: & Cavalry Carbines Numbered 1 to 6 & Artillery Carbines Numbered 7 to 12 & Enfield Rifles Numbered 1 to 6 (with long butt) & Enfield Rifles Numbered 7 to 12 (with short butt) Initially, 50 designs by various manufacturers were put forward but only 8 were selected as being practical. Of these 8, only 5 actually arrived for the test; capping breech loaders by Mont Storm, Wilson, Greene and Westley Richards. The other applicant was Snider with the only cartridge example in the test. The result of the trial is contained in report no. 3266, Committee Minute no. 11466 of April 4th 1864 This carbine was previously in the collection of the late Mr Peter Banwell before being sold to the vendor via Wallis & Wallis in May 1983

Provenance: This revolver was the property of Peter Hutchinson, Engineer on the Royal Navy Survey vessel, H.M.S. Sylvia and has been handed down by descent through five generations of the same family. H.M.S. Sylvia was a wooden screw gun vessel designed and built for the Royal Navy specifically as a survey ship. After her launch in March 1866, she was commissioned for service on the China Station and under command of Edward Wolfe Brooker and conducted survey work in Chinese and Japanese waters. By early 1868 - not least due to growing Western influence and aggression - Japan was reopening its borders after over 250 years of foreign isolation and had started to go through rapid socio-political changes. The same year, H.M.S. Sylvia replaced the Serpent as the main surveying ship in the region and over the next three years would survey the Japanese coast and Seto Inland Sea [Seto Naikai], to establish new, safer sea routes for the ever-growing fleets of Western and local trade and naval ships. In spring of 1871, after more surveying work in the Seto Inland Sea, H.M.S. Sylvia accompanied by the Japanese vessel Kasugamaru set off to survey and circumnavigate 'the almost unknown region of the Island of Yesso'. The island and its locals had only just been annexed in 1868 and the Japanese themselves had yet to fully explore and survey their newly acquired lands, waters (and citizens). The voyage was early on plagued by bad weather. With strong headwinds slowing them down, it took the steamer nearly a week after setting off from Yokohama on 5 April 1871 to reach the northernmost tip of the Japanese main island, Honshu, and soon after, their designated goal. The crew would spend the next weeks up and down the eastern coast of Hokkaido, visiting the city of Hakodate and other smaller ports and villages along the way. Although already well into spring, they were surprised by the rather cold temperatures and stormy weather, and their work often stalled due to squalls of wind, rain, and even snowfall. On 29 July 1871, after weeks of exploring the eastern coast of Hokkaido, H.M.S. Sylvia coaled in the harbour of Hakodate and finally set off to circumnavigate the island. Proceeding north-eastwards, stopping in harbours and villages along the way, they eventually passed Hokkaido's northernmost point at Cape Soya, before catching a glimpse of the newly designated city of Sapporo and anchoring back at Hakodate harbour at 2:30am on 24 August - having taken nearly a month to complete their voyage. After having finished their assignment at Hokkaido, H.M.S. Sylvia and her crew returned to waters around the main island of Japan and in August 1872 were ordered back to England. A scrap-book of period photographs and Japanese hand-painted watercolours accompanies the lot, together with a framed photograph of the ship's crew on deck and a copy of the Royal Navy crew list from 1870 expedition. It is possible some of the photographs were taken by Lt. Swinton Colthurst, a serving officer on the voyage. An archive of material relating to the Sylvia and Lt. Colthurst is held in the Greenwich Maritime Museum, to whom we are gratefully indebted for the above information







Provenance: The Lancaster register states 'Made for the Marques of Watteford (sic). 16 Bore, 9in. Barrels 5/8in. chambers 1850'. The date is probably incorrect, as pistol serial number 500 is known to be 1833 and number 3290 is dated 1860. The presence of 1843 census stamps would suggest these are nearer 1840. Henry de La Poer Beresford, 3rd Marquess of Waterford (1811 - 1859) was the second son of the 2nd Marquess, but became Earl of Tyrone and heir to the marquessate at age 13 following the death of his elder brother. Just two years later, following the death of his father, Henry inherited the title Marguess of Waterford. The following year his mother died and so the young Marquess was left without parental guidance, handsome, and incredibly wealthy. Waterford's 20's were littered with tales of wild exploits and debauchery. In 1835 he sailed to New York with his entourage, and after a night of drinking they embarked on a drunken spree on the way back to their lodgings smashing windows, lampposts and they "attacked, unmercifully beat, and nearly denuded, an inoffensive passer-by". A city watchman, having never been told to spare nobility, attempted to arrest the party, at which the Noble group took offence and beat the watchman. Eventually more of the watch joined the fight, overpowered the drunken cohort and arrested the lot. They were bailed out the next day by the British consul. A similar escapade occurred a few years later in Bergen, Norway, but the Bergen watch were made of sterner stuff and the young Marquess took a blow to the head from a watchman's morning star truncheon which nearly ended his life. An interview with the watchman in question revealed that "... he came upon a couple. The woman was wearing a man's hat, the gentleman was hatless. The gentleman took offense to the watchman's question and picked up a stone to wave it at him. The watchman, wanting to keep from being hit with a stone, tried to smack the gentleman's arm with a club. The ill-timed ducking happened and he clocked him on the head." The matter was resolved in court, Waterford was absolved of wrongdoing and the watchman (a father of four and military veteran) after agreeing to pay expenses was not prosecuted further. In 1836 Waterford embarked on a big game hunting trip to Tunis, he returned to his country seat, Curraghmore, with three lion cubs, which he kept in his bedroom and trained to accompany him around his estate. In 1837 Waterford and a group of friends attended the Croxton Park races, after which they descended on Melton Mowbray, where a tollkeeper somewhat unwisely demanded the group pay the toll. They barricaded the toll-keeper in his lodge, found some buckets of red paint and proceeded to daub the lodge, tollgate, and everything else in their path with red paint. Apparently, the group walked to a nearby public house called the Old White Swan. Waterford was hoisted onto the shoulders of his friends and painted the swan red. Whilst lacking credibility, this great tale is thought by some to have given rise to the phrase 'painting the town red'. In 1842 Waterford married Louisa Stuart, daughter of the 1st Baron Stuart de Rothesay, in Whitehall. The wedding was the place to be and the police had to keep order around the entrance of the church. They spent a week honeymooning in Surrey before returning to Curraghmore. By all accounts Waterford was a changed man, and well behaved until his death following a fall from his horse in 1859. There are also suggestions that the Marquis of Waterford was 'Spring Heeled Jack', a notorious urban legend of Victorian-era London. Spring Heeled Jack was described by people who claimed to have seen him as having a terrifying and frightful appearance, with diabolical physiognomy, clawed hands, and eyes that "resembled red balls of fire". One report claimed that, beneath a black cloak, he wore a helmet and a tight-fitting white garment like an oilskin. Many stories also mention a "Devil-like" aspect. Others said he was tall and thin, with the appearance of a gentleman. Several reports mention that he could breathe out blue and white flames and that he wore sharp metallic claws at his fingertips. The London attacks became rare after the 1840's which coincide with Waterford settling down. However, as that character's acts continued after his death in 1859, Waterford cannot be given sole responsibility.

IN THE GUNROOM HARKOM DOUBLE RIFLE DONALD DALLAS

If you want to see a stunningly beautiful hammerless double rifle of the very best quality, then study lot 735 in this sale, a Joseph Harkom of Edinburgh .500 sidelock no.2267 dating from 1896 and estimated at £4000 - £6000. It is completely different to a conventional double rifle yet it is as stylish as is possible to be.

Joseph Harkom was very unusual for an Edinburgh gunmaker in that he did the reverse of most provincial gunmakers, being born in London, yet for some reason travelling to Scotland to set up his business He was born in London in 1808 where his father was a gunmaker and was no doubt apprenticed to him. Instead of remaining in London, he re-located to Edinburgh and set up his business there in this 19th century city renowned for its quality gunmakers.

After various changes of address, he settled at the address that the firm is best known for, 32 Princes Street. His shop was virtually opposite the side entry to Waverley Station and of course just along the street was John Dickson & Son at 63 Princes Street.

He sired various sons most of whom became gunmakers and in 1870 the firm was renamed Joseph Harkom & Son. It was a large business and in the 1871 census he described himself as employing 11 men. Joseph Harkom died in 1881 aged 83 with the business now being carried on by his sons. Around 1897 the business re-located to 30 George Street and finally ceased trading in 1922 when Mortimer & Son took over the firm.

Joseph Harkom is always associated with the very stylish boxlocks guns he made, quite different in style to the conventional boxlock. Where he was also unique was that he did not buy in boxlock actions from Birmingham, he made them in Edinburgh and as a handsome addition, most were gold washed internally. His hammer guns likewise are all of high quality but compared to the other two quality names, Dickson and Henry, his production was far smaller.

Since he specialised in top quality sporting guns, if a customer came in and ordered a double rifle, Harkom would not have the experience or facilities to build one. He could easily have ordered one in the white from Birmingham, but with his eye for quality and style, he sought out one far closer to home, just a few blocks away, from none other than Alexander Henry in St Andrews Square in Edinburgh.

This lovely double rifle no. 2267 was not made by Harkom, but was made by Alexander Henry in 1896. Harkom would buy in the rifle from Henry in the white and then have it finished and engraved in his own in house style.

Henry by this time had established himself as the preeminent rifle maker in the world, selling rifles the length and breadth of the globe to many notable clients. Consequently, it made sense for Harkom to buy in this fine rifle from Henry. Henry had patented his design for a hammerless gun/rifle in patent no. 5273 of 1882. It was a



lever cocked hammerless action designed primarily for double rifles with a robust Jones underlever. Back action locks were employed used in conjunction with a beautifully sculpted action and the result was a very handsome yet powerful looking rifle. The design just exuded power and strength and yet at the same time it appeared graceful and elegant with its semi-rounded bar action bar. Due to the expense and quality, not a great many were built by the Henry, the Dimension Books recording a mere 241 including this one.

On this rifle, in addition to the Harkom serial number 2267, the number 6790 is stamped in the action, Alexander Henry's number showing that he built this rifle. A study of the Henry records shows that this rifle no 6790 was completed for stock on the 22nd June 1896 and subsequently sold to Harkom two years later on the 11th October 1898. Unfortunately, the Harkom records do not survive hence we have no idea who bought this rifle.

If you want a beautiful top quality double rifle that is a little bit different, then look no further afield than lot 735, a rare Henry double hammerless rifle yet bearing the name of Joseph Harkom. I have never seen another.

Bogardus Glass target balls

Clay pigeon shooting memorabilia is becoming increasing rare and collectible, with examples appearing from time to time at Holt's Fine Modern and Antique Firearms auctions. Their March sale has two Lots, numbers 306 and 7 of three sets of Victorian glass ball targets of "Bogardus" type, all circa 1890, with diamond shaped "string netting" design over the surface area, which caused the ball to break when hit and stopped shot ricocheting. The balls had a glass neck and were filled with powder, confetti, or feathers to simulate a bird when hit.

Glass target balls evolved from live pigeon shooting which started to become popular in Britain in the Georgian era of the late 1800's. Initially, pigeons were secured under old top hats and one of the first clubs, the Old Hats Club, was established behind a pub on Ealing Common. As shotgun manufacturing improved, popularity of the sport grew and old hats were replaced by purpose built wooden "traps", with a sliding lid attached to a string and on the command of "pull", the "trapper" yanked the string, releasing the "bird", as clays are still called. Holts auctioned two incredibly rare historic live pigeon traps in their July 2023 sale which sold for three times the top estimate. Throughout the 19th century, live pigeon shooting developed into a hugely competitive sport on which enormous sums of money were wagered on the outcome, whilst providing an opportunity for gunmakers and later. cartridge manufacturers. to demonstrate their wares.

Captive live pigeon shooting was immensely popular in America, but there were obvious limitations and attempts had been made at inventing inanimate targets of one sort or another for some decades on both sides of the Atlantic -Lord Huntingfield is reputed to have practiced on potatoes lobbed to him over the kitchen garden wall before the first ever driven partridge shoot, held in 1845 at his seat, Heveningham Hall, in Suffolk. Feather filled glass target balls had been around since 1866 in America and in Britain since 1875, fired by a gadget like a large catapult, but it was Capt. A H Bogardus, an internationally renowned American marksman, Great Plains safari guide and competition live pigeon shot, who commercialised them. In 1877 he took out patents on the Bogardus glass target ball and Bogardus trap, mounted on a wooden base with a large coil spring throwing arm capable of propelling a ball sixty feet in the air in a long, curving arc - Holts auctioned one example last year with an estimate of £200 - £300, which sold for £1100.

The Bogardus glass target balls and trap became all the rage and Bogardus, who claimed to be the *"Champion Living Shot* of the World", was the consummate showman. Touring America to demonstrate his target balls and trap, opening a shooting gallery in Chicago and for three years in the 1880's, was the star shooting attraction in Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show, until he fell out with William Cody and was replaced by Annie Oakley. Bogardus glass target balls were hand blown in a mould and manufactured in America by, among others,



Hagerty Bros of New York and Whitall, Tatum and Co. of New Jersey, but five of the balls for sale in the Holt's March auction have "N.B GLASS WORKS PERTH" in raised moulded letters round the circumference, indicating that these were made in Scotland by the North British glass works in Perth.

I imagine shooting glass balls filled with feather, powder, or confetti, must have been quite entertaining, but they dropped like a stone once they reached the apex of their arc and scarcely imitated the flight of a real bird. In 1880, George Ligowski, an American from Cincinnati, Ohio, invented the precursor to the modern clay that we know today, after watching children skimming clamshells across water. He recognised the sustained flight of the inverted shells, and their gradual fall would be improved if replicated in circular form and started experimenting with clay discs baked in a kiln.

These proved to be too hard for shot to break, or even tell if they had been hit, but eventually he struck on a successful mixture of baked limestone and bitumen. He is also credited with inventing the first successful trap machine for propelling his clays and as they gained popularity, many others produced trap machines, including Cogswell and Harrison, who developed the Swiftsure Trap in 1887. Eley were quick to manufacture clay pigeons to Ligowski's design and even early examples are now attracting value; in July 2023, Holt's auctioned a collection of eleven, including three rare Eley's and three variant examples of Ligowski's.

Ligowski's invention rang the death knell for the glass target ball, but Bogardus continued performing feats of marksmanship and trick shooting with his balls in theatres and circuses across America, in Paris and London, eventually dying in 1913. A H Bogardus has an important place in the pantheon of shooting: As public criticism mounted towards live pigeon shooting, he was instrumental in leading the change towards mechanical substitutes.

Sir Peter Markham Scott (1909-1989) CH, CBE, DSC (with Bar), FRS, FZA, named after the character Peter Pan (created by his godfather) was an ornithologist, conservationist, painter, naval officer, author, broadcaster and sportsman. He was also the son of the famous Robert Falcon Scott (Scott of the Antarctic) - who sadly died before meeting his son, but is recorded as writing in his final letter home before dying on the ill-fated mission to the South Pole, urging his wife to 'Make the boy interested in natural history' An early interest in wildfowling lead him to the path of wildlife conservation and painting, with wildfowl featuring heavily in his riconic 'Panda' logol During the Second World War he served with distinction in the Navy, being mentioned in despatches on at least three occasions before being awarded the DSC in 1943 for action in the English channel against German E-boats and subsequently a Bar later that year. He is also credited for designing the Western Approaches ship camouflage scheme, disguising the appearance of a ships superstructure (a scheme that would be utilised by the North Atlantic Fleet) An accomplished sportsman, he won a bronze medal for sailing at the 1936 Olympic Games, became the British Gliding Champion in 1963 and was a national championship level ice skater In the 1950's, his natural history series for the BBC 'Look' which made him a household name, would include the first ever natural history film to be shown in colour. He would go on to be involved in many programs and documentaries on natural history, often working with Sir David Attenborough and in 1966 narrated an Oscar-winning short documentary film 'Wild Wings' Having been appointed a Military MBE in the 1942 Birthday Honours, he was promoted to CBE in the Civil Division in the 1953 Coronation Honours and was knighted for services to conservation and the environment in 1973

Patrick Barron Hopkirk MBE (14 April 1933 - 21 July 2022) was born in Belfast, and is widely regarded as one of the United Kingdom and Ireland's finest rally drivers. Renowned for his exceptional skills behind the wheel, Hopkirk's career spanned several decades and left an indelible mark on the sport. Facing academic challenges due to dyslexia, he learned the basics of car control at the age of 9 when a local clergyman left him his invalid carriage in his will. He learned to master its motorcycle engine and rear-wheel brakes, noting that "it taught you quite a lot about skid control". The carriage was followed by a motorcycle and sidecar, and then an Austin 7 'Chummy' Tourer in which he made his rally debut. Bitten by the racing bug, Hopkirk dropped out of Trinity College, Dublin, to work for Volkswagen near Dublin. Hopkirk's first win came in 1953 at the Cairncastle hill climb at the wheel of a used V.W. Beetle. It was in a similar car that he competed in the Circuit of Ireland rally for the first time in 1953. Two years later, driving a Triumph TR2, he took a class win in the event and won his first Hewison trophy for the most successful Irish rally driver of the year; a trophy he would win for three consecutive years. Offered a seat by the Standard Motor Company, he led the early stages of the 1956 British rally and finished third in the Tulip Rally in the Netherlands. The following year Hopkirk joined the Rootes Group, driving a Hillman Husky in the Safari rally. Later that year he placed third overall and took a class win at the Alpine Rally in a Sunbeam Rapier, and he led the 1960 Safari Rally until his Rapier suffered a differential failure. He took two a Rapier in the touring car race supporting the 1960 British Grand Prix. Hopkirk finished third at the 1962 Monte Carlo Rally in a Sunbeam Rapier. However, Hopkirk finished third at the 1962 Monte Carlo Rally in a Sunbeam Rapier. However, Hopkirk was becoming frustrated by the Rapier's lack of reliability, culminating in all three works cars blowing their engines within the space of a kilometre at that year's Acropolis Rally. Moving to the British Motor Corporation (BMC), he first competed in a Mini at the 1963 Monte Carlo Rally, where he finished sixth. For the three-day midwinter Monte Carlo rally in 1964, Hopkirk and his co-driver Henry Liddon elected to start from Minsk in the Soviet Union. Racing the iconic Mini Cooper S, they navigated treacherous and icy conditions to win the rally, outmanoeuvring more powerful cars from Ford, Mercedes and Saab. The victory in the diminutive car, which came to symbolise cultural Britain in the 1960's, was cause for national celebration and made Hopkirk a household name: he received telegrams from the Beatles and the UK Prime Minister, and appeared along with his Mini on 'Sunday Night at the London Palladium'. In 1968, at the London-Sydney Marathon, Hopkirk gave up the chance of victory on the penultimate stage to save a competing rival, whose Citroën DS had just collided head-on with another car on a road supposedly closed to traffic. Hopkirk and his teammate managed to rescue the occupants from both cars that were starting to burn, likely saving the life of severely wounded Lucien Bianchi in the process. The accident happened just ahead of Hopkirk's Austin 1800. By driving back to warn onlookers and the police, Hopkirk and Nash likely also prevented another crash with any incoming participants. Hopkirk completed the rally in second place. His retirement from competition at the end of the 1960s allowed Paddy Hopkirk to concentrate on his businesses, including a driving school. In 2016 he was appointed MBE for charitable activities, and he used his profile and network to get organisations such as the BRDC to take part and help to raise the profile of further driver training as a way to save lives on the road.







Provenance: We have very kindly been supplied the following information by Tim Wilkes from research gathered in the process of his co-writing a book on Frederick Beesley: "Your Lot No 1451 in the forthcoming March auction, the F Beesley 12 bore sidelock ejector, has some interesting background. Incidentally, it was in an auction with Brightwells in 2004. It is number one of a trio of consecutively numbered guns, with a bespoke three gun box and stand. AO Barnes was the gentleman who made this exceptional, for Beesley, order and he picked them up from 2 St James's Street at the end of October 1908. The ledger describes them as best guns with Whitworth barrels, tube numbers 35755/6. The guns cost Beesley £38/10/0 each to make and were sold to Mr Barnes for £61/10/0 each. No mention is made in the ledger of barrel length. By this time Beesley had established that his best guns were all fitted with 29 ¾ inch long barrels, usually guite openly bored. The triple gun box had the correct Beesley label inside, filled out in his handwriting by the shop manager, Richard Street and noting that the guns were regulated for 33 grams of EC powder and 1 oz of 6 or 5 ½ shot from their 140 bored barrels. The fine quality, brass bound oak and leather box was stamped 'AO Barnes' on the lid, the interior lined in crimson baize. The three barrels were fitted into a top tray, another tray lifted out for snap caps and accessories with side sections for each stock. It had a fitted canvas and leather protective cover and a mahogany stand. No mention is made in the ledger of this rather splendid and no doubt rather expensive gun box. Guns numbered 2006 and 2007, the number two and three respectively of the trio, appear to have been sold as a pair during the Second World War, when Beesley had been absorbed into Grant & Lang. There is a note that this pair were presented in January 1944 by a 'Mrs S' to Gen AGL McNaughton of the Canadian Army. McNaughton was a gifted soldier but a controversial character. At the time of the presentation of the guns the married General appears to have been recalled from England to Canada. In October 1945 the pair of guns are back at Grant & Lang's Bury Street shop. In May 1957 they were noted to be in the possession of Mr GA Smith-Bingham. The final ledger note indicates that in June 1963 new barrels were fitted to the pair, being 30" long with 2 ½ inch chambers. We next come across the pair up for auction in 2007 at Holts. Meanwhile the magnificent triple gun box made an appearance at auction in England with Tenants in 2008, before it moved across the Atlantic to be auctioned in 2012 and again in 2018. It would be rather splendid to be able to bring this trio of guns back together again and to reunite them in their bespoke box. I hope this is of some interest, if not for the catalogue, then for the new owner of gun No. 2005. I have photographs of the other two guns and the box.

By the age of 21, he had already become a partner in a law firm in Michigan, demonstrating a keen business acumen that led to his first fortune in the early 1900s. He was also known as a socialite and sportsman, as well as an agent for the Whiting Manufacturing Company. The company leased Moore 1,600 acres atop Hooper Bald in the Appalachian mountains, where he wanted to establish a European-style shooting preserve. Moore had hunted boar on a private estate in Belgium and wanted to replicate the experience for the American elite. Given the remoteness of the site, it was an ambitious undertaking. but Moore had the passion and money to make it happen. In 1908 the remote site was only accessible by foot or horse, but by the time it was completed it had become a fully equipped preserve complete with a clubhouse boasting modern amenities such as indoor plumbing, electricity and telephone connectivity (albeit requiring extensive wiring through the mountains). The preserve boasted bison and Russian boar, Moore purchased 34 bears from zoos, 200 wild turkeys, more bison, mule deer and elk. To contain the animals, 25 tons of barbed wire was required. The imported animals were not always easy to manage. The bears had no difficulty climbing out of their wire enclosure. As former zoo animals, they were all too comfortable with humans and frequently appeared at the hunting lodge, demanding to be fed. One night, Moore arrived at Hooper Bald to find one of his guests, a young Englishman, with his arm and leg bandaged from wounds that he'd suffered while trying to oust a bear from his room. Moore claimed to have found the bears antics "amusing." Despite Moore's initial enthusiasm, the Hooper Bald project eventually faltered due to its remote location, leading to Moore's disillusionment with the venture. By the mid-1920s, the preserve was mostly abandoned, with only the caretaker, Cotton McGuire, remaining on site. Moore's entrepreneurial spirit persisted, leading him to New York where he flourished as a lawyer-turned-businessman, advising President Woodrow Wilson on military matters. He built a fortune with investments while maintaining the life of a high-living bachelor; playing polo and hosting lavish parties. A party he threw at the famed Ritz in New York City in 1912 was described by a reporter as a bash that "in magnificence and sumptuousness has never been surpassed in the history of brilliant entertainments held in that smart hotel." He rekindled his desire to create a hunting preserve, this time at a ranch in California. It is during this time Moore made the acquaintance of author F. Scott Fitzgerald. In April of 1925 Fitzgerald's novel The Great Gatsby was published. The story is set on Long Island's North Shore and in New York City during the summer of 1922, and there was much speculation that George Gordon Moore was the inspiration for Fitzgerald's Gatsby character. Throughout the twenties Moore spared no expense for lavish entertainment including extravagant parties that would include Hollywood starlets and in spite of prohibition, alcohol. The roaring twenties were alive and well at Rancho San Carlos. In 1929, however, the stock market crash wiped away Moore's fortune. By 1939, hard-pressed to satisfy his creditors, Moore was forced to sell the California ranch. Little is known about his life afterward. In May 1971 George Gordon Moore died in Los Angeles, California at age 94.

A valid Section 5 authority must be produced in order to view prohibited weapons.
